Dear Parent, Carers, Students & Friends,

'Parent involvement' has become a popular phrase in schools, and for good reason. Supporting your child's learning doesn't just feel nice; it also makes a significant difference in a child's performance.



Parent (and family) involvement is critical to student success in schools. We know this intuitively, and research confirms it. Parental involvement is associated with higher academic achievement outcomes and fewer behavioural problems.

Decades of research show that when parents get involved in their children's education, kids do better in and out of school. Parent involvement is tied to better grades, better social skills and improved behaviour. Kids of involved parents are more likely to stay in school and are more likely to continue their education beyond high school.

Michael Levine wrote about the important role that families play in their children's education:

"Research on young children's developing brains and self-regulation as active learners is now aligned with decades of research by experts on school climate and parent engagement. Dr. Daniel Siegel, a pioneering neuro-psychiatrist at UCLA, recently observed: 'studies of longevity, medical and mental health, happiness and even wisdom point to relationships as the most robust predictor of positive attributes in our lives across the lifespan.'

These insights align with what pioneers such as Dr. James Comer pointed out over two decades ago. The power of school is enhanced or diminished by the types of relationships that are formed at the core of our educational enterprise. Teachers, parents and students must be linked together in a relationship-rich environment that is open, flexible and which relentlessly promotes learning."

Success happens when families, students and teachers work together and holistically approach a child's education, focusing on a child's academic, social, and emotional needs.

So, what does real, meaningful, and collaborative parental involvement look like? Here are some ways you can help become involved in the school.

Parent involvement can include things as varied as quizzing your child on spelling words, volunteering in a classroom, or attending the school carnival. As long as your actions show that you value education, your child is likely to respond.

Simple things such as reading a book together at bedtime really count. Communicating with the teacher about your child's progress and challenges is important. Attending school events shows your child that school is an important part of your family life. Volunteering just a few hours a year can make a difference for the school. If you're ready to do more, contact the school office and they will help you find ways to get involved that fit both your schedule and your interests.

TOUR OF SCHOOL



NAPLAN TESTING 2015

National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) testing will be conducted from 12 -14 May 2015 for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 across Australia. These national tests will provide information on how Australian students are performing in the areas of numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation and will assist teachers in identifying student strengths and weaknesses. By analysing results along with information from teacher judgements and work samples, teachers can adjust teaching strategies to provide appropriate support. The aggregation of student results from the NAPLAN provides schools with an overview of current achievements for groups of students and contributes to a more comprehensive understanding of their performance. The analysis of aggregated results assists school planning and can be used to monitor literacy and numeracy development over time.

QUALITY SCHOOLS SURVEY

As in previous years, all Catholic schools in the Parramatta Diocese will participate in the Quality Catholic Schools Survey in 2015. This survey provides data from staff, parents and students about each school's cultural behaviour, relationships and learning community and assists to focus efforts for improvement by building on successes to date. From 9th March all OLOW staff, 60 randomly-selected parents and all Year 5 & 6 students will be asked to complete the on-line survey. Parents will have the choice of a paper or on-line survey. The survey will take about 20 minutes to complete.

A survey consultant, *Insight SRC*, manages the data collection. All survey data is kept strictly confidential and no individual can be identified by the school or the Catholic Education Office. Each school receives an information report at the end of May and uses the report to inform their future planning.

If you are selected to complete the survey, I would encourage your participation, as this will help our school identify our strengths and areas in which we can focus our improvement. If you have any questions, please contact Mr Mifsud or Mrs Veling.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

At OLOW, we place a strong emphasis on social justice experiences. They are learning experiences, not just fundraising, as this deepens the children's knowledge and understanding of social justice. Some examples of our social justice initiatives include:

- ★ Project Compassion, Diocesan Works Fund, the Winter Food Appeal for the Penrith Community Kitchen, and making up hampers for the Vinnies Christmas Appeal are some of the practical ways our school community displays a sense of social justice and cares for those in greatest need within our local and worldwide community. We also have close ties with the local chapter of the St Vincent de Paul Society and Mama Lana's Community Foundation.
- ★ Each year we have a strong interaction with and support of Caritas Australia which includes inviting guest speakers who help deepen the children's knowledge and understanding of the needy in our world.
- ★ We strongly believe that social justice begins at home as we strive to: Act Justly, Love Tenderly and Walk Humbly with our God. In this way we are conscious of social justice being ever present in the way we do things within our own community in order to model this concept for the children and to engage them in it. A concerted effort is made to reach out and care for families and children within our own school who were in the greatest need of support and compassion.

EXTRA CURRICULA OPPORTUNITIES

Extra Curricula opportunities at Our Lady of the Way, are based on the student's interest, their commitment to train or rehearse as well as their behaviour. Extra Curricula opportunities are 'extra' and therefore are a privileged event. These are privileged events because the students are representing our school, students require self-regulation and trust to be in different environments and with other students, teachers and parents to be safe, responsible ambassadors. Last year, the school received regular feedback about how well-mannered our students are to each other and others.

During the year OLOW students will have many opportunities to participate in extra curricula activities and I wish to thank the staff for their tireless effort placed on each activity. This year we will have representatives in swimming, netball, soccer, gymnastics, touch football, athletics and basketball.

Students at OLOW have the opportunity to be part of the Chess Championships and the Dance Fever Interschool Challenge. Our choir has been invited to take part in the larger **CAPTIVATE** choir. They are already rehearsing and will perform on 16th and 18th June at Nagle College as part of a larger presentation of the performing Arts. Over 500 students across the Diocese are involved in 2015.

CATHOLIC CULTURE

What does having a Catholic Culture mean? Here are some of the ways OLOW is a Catholic School and Parish Community:

- ★ We celebrate together many school masses and liturgies such as our Opening School Mass, Ash Wednesday Mass and Infants Liturgy, Easter Week celebrations, Grandparents Day Mass, End of Year Thanksgiving Mass, OLOW Feast Day Mass for Our Lady Help of Christians, Mothers' and Fathers' Day prayer, ANZAC Day prayer, Year 6 Farewell Mass, The Christmas Story, just to name a few.
- ★ Children from the school participate in the Sunday parish masses twice a term.
- ★ Preparation to receive the sacraments First Eucharist in May and November; First Reconciliation in June and Confirmation in August.

Parent, grandparents, friends and community members are always welcome to join us celebrate and pray together.

DID YOU KNOW?

According to the most recent figures available (2012), the average net cost of educating a student in a NSW Catholic school was \$11,532 per year. This is less than the cost of educating a student in a government school (\$12,118) or in an independent, non-government school (\$16,654). Catholic schools still rely on Federal and State Governments for more than 75% of our funding needs. This is why funding support from Federal and State Governments must keep pace with rising education costs - to maintain education quality and to ensure a Catholic education remains affordable for all families.

KISS & RIDE AND TRAFFIC PROCEDURES

Safety of our children on the way to and from school is paramount in all our minds. Safe pedestrian, safe driving habits and parent role modelling of safe behaviours will contribute much towards the safety of our children. Please be considerate of our neighbours by not blocking their driveways or parking on their premises.

The local police and rangers patrol Forbes and Troy Streets on a regular basis, therefore you need to be aware of traffic and parking regulations to avoid fines.

- ★ Do not park across driveways.
- ★ Children must always alight from the car from the LEFT hand side.
- ★ If using the Kiss & Ride in the morning the driver must not leave the car.
- ★ Plan to leave home earlier in the morning so your child isn't rushing to get out of the car if running late.
- ★ In the afternoon please hold your child's hand when crossing the road.
- ★ Don't jaywalk failing to use a zebra crossing that is within 20 metres of your location.
- ★ Please don't park in the staff/parish car park.

Unit: Servant Leadership

Kindergarten


Unit: God Loves ME

Some more thoughts (continuing on from the last newsletter) to consider from Pope Francis...

6. Prayer

"In the face of so many wounds that hurt us and could harden our hearts, we are called to dive into the sea of prayer, which is the sea of God's boundless love, to taste his tenderness. Lent is a time of prayer, of more intense prayer, more prolonged, more assiduous, more able to take on the needs of the brethren; intercessory prayer, to intercede before God for the many situations of poverty and suffering." – Homily, March 5, 2014

7. Fasting

"We must be careful not to practice a formal fast, or one which in truth 'satisfies' us because it makes us feel good about ourselves. Fasting makes sense if it questions our security, and if it also leads to some benefit for others, if it helps us to cultivate the style of the Good Samaritan, who bends down to his brother in need and takes care of him." – Homily, March 5, 2014

8. Almsgiving

"Today gratuitousness is often not part of daily life where everything is bought and sold. Everything is calculated and measured. Almsgiving helps us to experience giving freely, which leads to freedom from the obsession of possessing, from the fear of losing what we have, from the sadness of one who does not wish to share his wealth with others." – Homily, March 5, 2014

9. Help the Poor

"In the poor and outcast we see Christ's face; by loving and helping the poor, we love and serve Christ. Our efforts are also directed to ending violations of human dignity, discrimination and abuse in the world, for these are so often the cause of destitution. When power, luxury and money become idols, they take priority over the need for a fair distribution of wealth. **Our consciences thus need to be converted to justice, equality, simplicity and sharing.**" – Lenten Message, 2014

10. Evangelize

"The Lord asks us to be joyous heralds of this message of mercy and hope! It is thrilling to experience the joy of spreading this good news, sharing the treasure entrusted to us, consoling broken hearts and offering hope to our brothers and sisters experiencing darkness." – Lenten Message, 2014

You probably won't be able to take huge steps forward in all of these areas. Instead, pick a couple that stand out to you and try to find practical ways to grow in your love of God and your love of your neighbour.



BEING CYBERSMART

Keeping our Children safe online.

Social networking describes a variety of services like Facebook, YouTube, Instagram, World of Warcraft, Moshi Monsters, Twitter, Skype, Snapchat, Minecraft and many others. All of these services enable direct interaction between individuals. Users can post information about themselves, display photos, tell people what they've been up to, chat and play games. Social networking forms a part of the social identity of many teens.

While social networking offers many benefits, there are risks. Sometimes children can forget who they are communicating with online and who might see the information they post. It can be easier for children and teens to say and do things online that they might not do offline. It can also be easier to talk to strangers online than it is offline, and they may confide too much in people they don't know well.

It is important that children understand the risks associated with disclosing information about themselves online and know how to manage both their privacy and online 'friends'.

Is my child old enough for social networking sites like Facebook, Instagram, Youtube, Tumblr, Twitter, Kik etc?

Most high profile social networking sites ask users set up a profile with photos and information about themselves. <u>13 is the minimum</u> user age required by Facebook, Instagram, Youtube, Tumblr and Twitter. Kik recommends that users are 17 years or older.

If your child is 13+ you should still consider the following:

- Is your child able to withstand taunts from others?
- Does your child understand what is safe to put online?
- Does your child know how to report abuse and offensive content?
- Are you worried your child will be left out?
- Are you going to supervise or 'friend' your child on social sites?

Keep them safe online.

- Nothing replaces parental supervision and education for kids about cybersafety.
- 2. Set a technology curfew.
- Remind your child to never give out identifying information such as your home address, school name or telephone number in a public message such as chat or newsgroups.
- 4. If your child posts photos online, use privacy settings to limit access to people they know well.
- 5. Remind your child that people don't always tell the truth online, and they can't take anything at face value.
- Reassure your child that they can tell you anything, without fear of losing the laptop or internet access.
- If they get a message or email that's threatening or rude, they should 'STOP, BLOCK, TELL'.

- 8. The First step is to tell your child to stop responding to the abuse and then block those people sending threatening or rude messages if they continue. Let your child know that if they are being bullied, or know someone else who is, they should tell a trusted adult.
- Never click on any links that are contained in emails from people they don't know. As well as sexual content, they could contain a computer virus.
- 10. If you suspect your child has been contacted by a predator, try to save a copy of the chat log (or whatever form the contact takes) for evidence. Call <u>Crime Stoppers</u> 24-hour line 1800 333 000 to make a formal complaint.
- 11. Your child will be using computers and the technology for the rest of their lives you're in the great position of being able to get them off to a safe, positive start.
- At OLOW we promote and believe in the need to respect the rights, beliefs and viewpoints of others.
- We encourage all members of our community to follow the same standards of behaviour online as you are expected to follow in real life.

Book Club online Credit Card payments.


From 2015, parents who wish to pay for Book Club orders using credit cards will now be invited to use Scholastic's new LOOP system (Linked Online Ordering and Payment).
