The continuum identifies the literacy skills and understandings regarded as critical to literacy success. #### **Around the Classrooms:**

The events of Holy Week provide the most important stories of our Catholic tradition. The children of Kindergarten explored the Scripture of the events of Palm Sunday and the Last Supper through story-telling and enactment. The following stories were shared with them and they became part of the story. They were given the opportunity to know what it felt like to be in the crowd that welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem and to be gathered around him as he shared the Last Supper.

#### Palm Sunday ...

Lots of people crowded around to greet Jesus their king.

They waved palm branches and shouted "Hosanna. Blessings on the King who comes in the name of the Lord."

On Friday the 23<sup>rd</sup> of May at 2:15pm, our school community will share a Liturgy of the Word to celebrate the Feast of Our Lady Help of Christians, the patroness of our country (feast day May 24).

In the early years of the colony Catholics had no priests and were not allowed to celebrate Mass. The reciting of the rosary helped to keep their faith alive. Mary's connection to the early Australian Catholic community was important. In 1844 our country was dedicated to the patronage of Our Lady Help of Christians.

# Types of Texts

Teachers teach children to write texts. Texts can be classified as belonging to one of three types: imaginative, informative or persuasive, although it is acknowledged that these distinctions are neither static nor watertight and particular texts can belong to more than one category.

Imaginative texts – texts whose primary purpose is to entertain through their imaginative use of literary elements. They are recognised for their form, style and artistic or aesthetic value. These texts include novels, traditional tales, poetry, stories, plays, fiction for young adults and children including picture books and multimodal texts such as film.

Informative texts – texts whose primary purpose is to provide information. They include texts which are culturally important in society and are valued for their informative content, as a store of knowledge and for their value as part of everyday life. These texts include explanations and descriptions of natural phenomena, recounts of events, instructions and directions, rules and laws and news bulletins.



**Persuasive texts** – whose primary purpose is to put forward a point of view and persuade a reader, viewer or listener. They form a significant part of modern communication in both print and digital environments. They include advertising, debates, arguments, discussions, polemics and influential essays and articles



Choose one of the above types of text and jointly construct it with your son or daughter. It can be a recipe for a delicious cake (Informative text), a poem about a holiday (Imaginative text), or a poster advertising a great book you have read together (Advertisement). Send your Text in to school and we will display it in our breezeway or even put it in the next Newsletter.


