#### PENTECOST: THE CHURCH'S BIRTHDAY

Each year the Church celebrates 50 days of Easter, culminating at the feast of Pentecost. Sunday is Pentecost and it marks the occasion of God's sending the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples after his resurrection.

Before Pentecost, the disciples were unsure of what they were to do next, and spent most of their time in hiding. After Pentecost, and the gift of the Holy Spirit, they understood their mission to spread the Good News of Jesus, and they had the courage to come out of hiding and speak openly about who Jesus was, and what he had accomplished by his dying and rising.

Because Pentecost brought the disciples this clarity of mission, it is regarded as the founding feast of the Christian Church. Before Pentecost, the disciples of Jesus are tentative and disorganized. After Pentecost, they are a people with a mission, who perceive themselves as spiritually and sacramentally connected to the risen Christ.

Today, celebrations of Pentecost still centre on the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and the power of those gifts to both draw people together, and to send them forth to spread the word.

Of course, one of the remarkable elements of the story of the first Pentecost was the miracle of understanding, in which everyone in the diverse crowd in Jerusalem hears the disciples speaking in the listeners' own language. It's a reminder that although we've heard the story before, we have inherited the mission of those first disciples.

In fact, everyday is Pentecost for us as we engaged with the Spirit. This is our faith – to love one another!

However, 100% is the ideal. It is great to know that we have so many families who try to ensure their children attend school every day.

- talk to someone you trust straight away—like a parent, sibling, uncle/aunt, teacher or friend, or contact <u>Kids Helpline</u>
- don't retaliate or respond—they might use it against you
- · block the bully and change your privacy settings
- report the abuse to the service and get others to as well
- collect the evidence—keep mobile phone messages, take screen shots and print emails or social networking conversations
- do something you enjoy—catch-up with friends, listen to good music, watch a good show or chat online to people you can trust
- remember you didn't ask for this—nobody deserves to be bullied and you will get through this.

# A LETTER FROM A SERVICEMAN TO OUR STUDENTS

#### Hello Ma'am.

I recently received some letters from a care package that was sent to us in the Middle East Region (MER). It was really great to read the letters and I appreciate the effort the students /teachers have gone to. I can tell you the goodies inside of the care package was distributed amongst us and they didn't last long. So thank you, the teachers and the children very much.

Unfortunately it did not make it to us for Anzac Day, but it did get here. We had our service on base which was moving as it is my first one deployed and it brings it home just what we are actually doing in this place and all those that have gone before just a little bit more.

One letter I received was from Hayden Jenkins.

He has stated that he wrote the letter because his class is having a discussion about the Army. I am actually in the Royal Australian Air Force and have been for 22 years, however I have an avid interest in the first and second world wars and have read many books on the subject. I have even been fortunate enough to have visited the First World War battlefields in France and Belgium both in and out of uniform. I hope the discussion was listened to with interest as even I think those Diggers were exceptionally brave.

Could you please let him know that the gifts and items were shared out evenly amongst my team and everyone thought it was Christmas all over again. We appreciate the thanks, it means a lot however I am just doing my duty. I hope Hayden had a good school break and an even better time in Canberra on the school camp as there is plenty to see and do while there. The war memorial is something pretty special and I have been there many times while I was stationed at Wagga.

The other letter I received was from Sophie Lusk.

Could you please let her know that it does mean a lot to us/me that the people of Australia are behind us and support what we are doing over here.

My war experience is completely different to the ones that she will see in Canberra and I have the utmost respect for what our armed forces have achieved over the years. Listening to some of the old diggers, airman and naval exploits from the people who were actually there are hard to imagine, even for me. Parliament house is an interesting place to visit and maybe she might find her way into politics in the future? A budding politician?

I thank her for best wishes and I am just doing my duty.

Sophie asked if I follow any sporting teams as she follows the Penrith Panthers. The answer is yes. I am a Newcastle Knights supporter in NRL, Liverpool fan in soccer and Adelaide Strikers fan in cricket.

She also asked what is it like to be away from my family? I miss my wife and two daughters (who are grown up but are still going to University) and my dog. I try and keep busy, so the time I am not at work I do not miss them too much. I have an opportunity to talk to them over Skype and Facebook, which definitely helps. You miss the little things you can do with family but can't do here, it helps to know that we are here for a reason and we need to finish it.

Last question was what type of training do you do? When I initially joined up I commenced Initial Recruit Training which lasted for 10 weeks and taught us military life, drill, weapons, theory on military history and law. I then went to Wagga Wagga for Technical Training where I learnt my trade as an Aircraft Structural Technician (easier to say an Aircraft Sheet Metal Worker) which lasted for a year. From there I got posted to a unit that worked on F-111's which was 501Wing, Amberley in QLD for 4.5 years, more training as an Aircraft Welder at Wagga Wagga for 16 weeks, then to F/A-18 Hornets in Williamtown as a welder for 2 years, next was F/A-18's in Tindal NT for 5 years, back to Wagga as an instructor for 4 years, then to 92Wing to work on AP3-C Orion's for 4 years and now if I was back home I would be working on PC-9's in Adelaide. Each aircraft type has specific training and courses that you have to do. So the training never ends for us. For this deployment I had two weeks training back in QLD and when I got here, I had two more days training before learning on the job for the next week. I am currently not working on aircraft but in an administration role. This is a very big change for me and I am learning all the time.

Could you please pass on my thanks and let the children know their efforts are fully appreciated.

# LEARNING NEWS

# CELEBRATIONS OF LEARNING

As part of our Celebrations of Learning next Tuesday, The Infants and Primary choirs will perform to the school at 9am. Many of our mothers and grandmothers witnessed their first performance for the year at our Mother's Day Devonshire Tea. This is an opportunity for our wider community to view the performance.

They will perform at 9am on the playground.

## YEAR 2 EXPLORE THE PAST

The Year 2 students recently presented speeches about an object from the past. They all did a wonderful job, sharing how these objects were used and what replaces them today.

## **Billy: The Lawn Mower**

My topic today is lawn mowers. Before lawn mowers, they had animals grazing on the lawns or they would use a scythe to cut the grass at an even height.

The first lawn mower was invented in England in 1830. He got his idea from a tool used to cut carpet. The next type of lawn mower had side wheels and it was lighter and cheaper to make.

In 1890 lawn mowers with a motor were invented. They had petrol or steam to power them. Today power mowers come in 4 types:

- 1. A tractor
- 2. A ride on lawn mower
- 3. A power reel mower
- 4. A rotary mower

## Did you know-

- that rotary mowers are the most common mowers in backyards?
- Mr Richardson invented the Victa lawn mower? He made it in his backyard using scrap metal, billy cart wheels and a peach tin as a fuel tank. After 4 years he had sold 60 000 Victa lawn mowers, had his own company and became a millionaire!
- The Victa lawn mower is one of Australia's top 10 invention?
- The Victa lawn mower's blade spins 3000 times per minute?
- In the future a robotic lawn mower will be used to cut grass? It is battery powered and quiet enough to work at night. It could be controlled by an app on your phone.

These are my thoughts and opinions:

- Before powered lawn mowers, cutting grass was very hard
- Lawn mower s come in lots of sizes
- It is fun to use a push lawn mower like the one at the Australian Arms Inn Museum.

I hope one day I can invent something like Mr Richardson.

#### Layla: The Cassette Tape

Good morning Year 2, today I will be talking about an object from the past. The object I have chosen is a cassette tape.

Audio Cassette tapes were first used in the 60's and are very rare today, but can still be brought and used.

The cassette was used to record music and talking so you could listen to it whenever you would like and over and over again.



Today we listen to music on cd's but it is more popular to download music onto your phone, ipod, or computer. Then you can listen to it whenever you like or wherever you are.

My Dad told me that cassettes had 2 sides. A side A and side B, each side has different songs on it. He use to use a pencil to rewind the tape.

My mum when she was little used to record songs from the radio onto a tape, so she could listen to the songs without buying them at the shops, then she would listen to them on her cassette player.

I think that the tape cassette was a good invention, but iPods, iPads, computers and phones are better because it's easier to download music and listen to music wherever you are.



#### Ashton: The Lawn Mower

I would like to tell you about the history of the lawn mower. It was first made to cut grass on sports grounds and large gardens as it took too long to cut big areas by hand.

The first lawn mower had a blade reel, wheels and a handle. It had to be pushed from behind to make the blades cut the grass.

Mowers today still need to be pushed. They are also easier to use as they are powered by petrol, making the blades spin and the mower easier to push.



I found the old mower at the museum very heavy and hard to push. It was very old but still worked. It is very different to the one at my house because it didn't need petrol and you didn't have to pull the cord to make it start.

## Emma: Nintendo Game

The object I have chosen from the past is the first Nintendo Game Boy. It was one of the first handheld gaming consoles.



The Game Boy was used in the 1980s and 1990s. My dad had one when he was 14 years old.

The Game Boy worked by putting a game cartridge in the back and turning it on. You needed 4 batteries to make it work. It had a really small screen and only a couple of buttons. It only made a few sounds.

There were only a few games that could be played on the Game Boy. They were Tetris, Bowling, Baseball and Tennis. My dad's favourite game was Super Mario Land.

There are new models of Game Boys around now. They have coloured screens, camera and some of them are 3D. Children now also have iPads and iPhones to play with.

I think the first Nin-ten-do Game Boy would be hard to play. It was pretty heavy and it has a really small screen that is green and black.
