Dear Parents, Carers, Students & Friends,

The 20th June is Refugee Day. It falls within Refugee Week which is held annually and which promotes positive images of refugees and celebrates the valuable contribution refugees make to Australian society.

This year, the Refugee Council of Australia is encouraging organisations and families to celebrate a unified Refugee Week based around the theme 'With courage let us all combine'. Many of you will notice that the theme for Refugee Week comes from Australia's National Anthem – second verse... "For those who've come across the seas, we've boundless plains to share; with courage let us all combine to Advance Australia Fair."

Maybe some of you, like me, have had the blessing of parents or grandparents who had sacrificed living in a country that was familiar to them and leaving loved ones, to come in search of a better life. I know for my parents this was very difficult, but they were convinced that a life in Australia would provide opportunities for a better standard of living. While I know that my mother and my father missed their family every day and longed at times for the place of their birth and upbringing, they never once regretted their choice to immigrate to Australia. Although my family were not refugees and I could never say I understand the trauma of having to leave a home that was no longer safe, I certainly understand the apprehension often felt and the gratitude directed towards such generous and welcoming people that soon became our neighbours and friends.

I can say I never felt out of place. I look back with great fondness on those memories. You may have some of your own. The reality is, just like our National Anthem we do have, 'boundless plains to share' and it is important to remember this. Unfortunately the media will often lead us to believe that we have no more room and this 'spirituality of lack' is quite toxic. Of course just like all civil society this does not mean we do not have regulations to follow and laws to obey, but then of course that is one of the reasons Australia is such a wonderful land and so many people want to make this their home too.

Let us embrace the spirit of this year's Refugee Week and pray that we as a nation continue to fight for the rights of all and the courage to embrace those who wish to join our society in peace and generosity.

EXCITING ENGLISH

How do you help spur your child's literacy skills along? Oral language is such an important skill for children to develop and plays a significant role in the development of your child's reading and writing. Are you one of those parents who wants to support your child's oral language development? Well read on then...



TALK! TALK! SOME EASY POINTERS FOR PARENTS TO IMPLEMENT

- Model a rich vocabulary You will be surprised how quickly children pick up words and then use them in their writing.
- Play games and have fun with words Games like scrabble, boggle, charades, hangman, making words up from car number plates.
- Provide the time and place for imaginative play Pretend play is strongly linked to language, narrative language, abstract thought, problem solving, logical sequential thought, creation of stories, social competence with peers, understanding a social situation, integration of emotional, social and cognitive skills, and the ability to play with others in the role of a 'player'.

MATHEMATICS - HOW DO WE DO THAT?

Following are some of the strategies that the children use at OLOW when they are thinking and working mathematically.

1. Counting across the decades/hundreds

- ★ From 39 to 40
- ★ From 99 to 100
- ★ From 299 to 300

Counting backwards makes these transitions even harder. For example, to go from 30 to 29, the students' need to not only think that the twenties come before the thirties, but also to go to 29 rather than 20.

2. Estimating

Take a handful of objects and make an educated assessment of how many there are. Knowing the answer to 136 + 687 or 1234 – 432 will be less than 1000.

3. Using their knowledge of place value to estimate logical estimates to a variety of mathematical questions such as these:

★ Doubles:

$$8 + 8 = 16$$
 $7 + 7 = 14$ $6 + 6 = 12$

★ Near Doubles:

Knowing that one way of answering 8 + 9 = 17, is to know that 8 + 8 = 16, and that 9 is simply 8 + 1. I can add one more to get the answer 17.

★ Commutativity:

Identify that 5×7 is the same as 7×5 , that 2 + 19 is the same as 19 + 2.

★ Using the Distributive Property:


That 7 x 6 is the same as and can be found by adding $[7 \times 5]$ to $[7 \times 1]$.

★ Skip Counting

That 6×3 is the same as counting 6 [and another 6] 12 [and another 6] = 18

★ Using a dot array:

The answer to the array below will be 25 even though we cannot see all the squares.





There are so many ways we can help develop and foster our children's understanding In Mathematics. Some further strategies you can use at home include:

- ★ Playing games that involve dice and looking at the patterns made or adding their values when using more than one dice, to show them that Mathematics matters and can be fun.
- ★ Helping them to group objects by asking them to set the table or put the cutlery away correctly.
- ★ Pointing out Mathematics in everyday life whenever you are shopping, cooking, driving, recognising shapes in the environment etc.
- ★ Asking how they work out Mathematical questions. When children are asked how to articulate how they worked something out, it helps build their knowledge, and lets you see what they know and how they know it. It also helps boost their confidence.

Feast of the Sacred Heart and Penrith Community Kitchen Collection:



Tomorrow, as a school community we will celebrate the Feast of the Sacred Heart. The feast day was first celebrated in 1765 in France. In 1856, almost 100 years later, Pope Pius IX, extended the feast to the universal Church. It is celebrated on the Friday after the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) or 19 days after Pentecost Sunday. The Sacred Heart of Jesus represents not simply his physical heart but his love for all mankind.

List 3 words that describe the character. e.g. brown, little, scared

What is the setting? e.g In the forest.

PROMPTS FOR CHILDREN READING MORE COMPLEX TEXTS

Where does the story take place?

What is the story about?

What do you think will happen next?


If you could ask the author something, what would you ask?






