## **ATTENDANCE - EVERY LEARNER - EVERY DAY**



At *Our Lady of the Way*, we continue to promote positive student attendance. Thank you to our parents for the support and value that you place on your child being at school each day. Regular school attendance plays a *critical role* in ensuring that every student has access to the same learning opportunities. When students are not at school, are late to school or leave school early, they are missing out on so much that can impact on their future learning.



Our school average this week is 86.9%, which is below the CEDP target of 90%. Congratulations to Kindergarten, Year 4 and Year 6 who continue to display excellent attendance. We love seeing all our students at school!

Absence Explanation Note: If your child is away from school, a note explaining their absence is required within 7 days of returning to school. If no note is received the absence is recorded as 'unexplained'. Parents can use the Skoolbag app to email an absence note to school.

Partial Absences (PA) are recorded for each child every time they are late to school or leave early from school. Partial Absence from school does add up to time away from learning, settling into routines of the day or saying goodbye at the end of the day. It is important that all children are at school by 8:45am when our school day starts. A Partial Absence is recorded from this time and an explanation is required by parents or a carer when signing children in through the Office.







#### **READING RECOVERY**

#### SCHOOL LEAVERS

We are planning for the 2019 school year and to help us with this please let the office know if your family will not be continuing at OLOW in 2019. A reminder to families that a term's notice (10 school weeks) in writing MUST be given to the principal before the removal of a student or a full term's fees will be payable. The notice can be given any time during the term for the next term and where appropriate notice has been received, a prorata credit will be calculated. Where a term's notice has not been given to the principal, the term's school fees will be charged for your child/children.

#### SWIMMING PROGRAM: KINDERGARTEN – YEAR 4

Information about our swimming program went home this week. The program is booked for Week 7 - Monday 26<sup>th</sup> November to Friday 30<sup>th</sup> November. All students in Kindergarten, Year 1, Year 2, Year 3 and Year 4 will attend this five-day (60 minutes each day) intensive program at Nepean Aquatic Centre, Lambridge Place, Penrith. This program is funded by your child's annual activity fee paid via school fees. If your school fees are not up-to-date, please pay for this activity at the office.

## SCHOOL OPAL CARDS

School Bus Opal Card School student applications for 2019 open from Monday, 15 October 2018. Students progressing to year 3 and year 7 do not need to re-apply if they:

- are continuing at the same school
- are residing at the same address
- have not been sent an expiry notification from Transport for NSW.

Where a student meets the new distance eligibility, the system will automatically update their entitlement. If they do not meet the new eligibility, they will receive an expiry notification. Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition, which is due to, expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply. Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply. If students need to update their information or reapply, they should go online to https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails.

## FROM THE ACTING ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

Three weeks ago I was fortunate enough to attend a writing conference in Canberra hosted by the Primary English Teaching Association. The title of the conference was 'Writing the Future'. Many authors and experts presented sessions encouraging teachers to inspire our children and young adults to develop a love of writing.

Louise Park (who also writes under the pseudonym of H.I. Larry, Mac Park & Poppy Rose and has written the Zac Powers, Boy vs Beast, Star Girl and Harriet Clare series) shared with us great strategy for encouraging children to write creatively. If you are looking to support your children with writing at home, why not give this a try.

- 1. Start by asking your child/ children to close their eyes and be ready for a meditation that you can lead.
- 2. Ask them to imagine they are sitting at the top of a roller-coaster.
- 3. Now ask them to reflect on the following questions:
  - what do you look like?
  - what are you wearing?
  - what sort of personality do you have?
  - what do you see? Look forward, to the side, behind you.
  - what do you hear?
  - what do you smell?
  - what can you taste?
  - what is the seat like?
  - what emotions are you feeling?
- 4. Have the children open their eyes and complete what Louise calls a 'brain dump', where they just brainstorm a list of everything they can remember that they thought about.
- 5. Now it is time to write. The children write their notes to create a descriptive paragraph detailing what it was like sitting at the top of roller-coaster.

Here's an example of what Lucas in Year 4 created when he, along with the other students, were taken through the process:

Riding up a mountain, the taste of hot chips in my mouth. My heart is racing until I drop. Butterflies in my stomach, hearing loud screams from below. So high up I can barely see. There is hair in my face and my palms are sweating. I'm in my favourite t-shirt on a big drop, holding on tight with a loop-de-loop ahead. As we drop my face turns white and I scream in terror with the lights off...

It took just fifteen minutes to go through the process and create this paragraph. See what your young writer can achieve!




2018 Australian Children's Laureate, Morris Gleitzman also spoke to us. Morris is a talented writer, whose intended audience is children between the ages of eight and twelve. His main characters are children of the same age group who often have to deal with overwhelming problems. Morris told us that his intention is for our children to read his books and learn important lessons:

- if they are faced with problems, who would they ask to help them?
- could they research what is needed?
- what strategies would they use?
- what problem solving skills are needed?
- resilience is an important result!









If your children have not discovered Morris Gleitzman books, you might like to introduce them to Felix in the 'Once' Series, Jamal and Bibi in 'Boy Overboard', Bridget in 'Girl Underground' or Ludo in his latest book 'Help Around the House'. If you would like your children to meet kind, thought provoking, unassuming heroes, have a read!





